### Reception Work to support your child at home PHONICS

Below are some examples of how you can support your child at home with their phonics knowledge.

Today, your challenge is to see if you can add any more sentences of your own?
 So yesterday's example sentences were:

#### Reception Work to support your child at home MATHS - Weight

Most children will already have experience weight through carrying heavy and light items. COMMON MISCONCEPTON, children often think that the bigger the item the heavier it is.

Encourage your child to make direct comparisons using their hands to estimate which item feels heaviest. Prompt them to use language of heavy, heavier, heaviest and light, lighter, lightest to compare items starting with items which have an obvious difference in weight.

Today you are going to become human scales!! Go on the hunt for items around the house or in the garden. Ask your grown up for help. Find two items and show your grown up which one is the heavier by tipping down to the heavier side.

To extend this activity you could check the weight of each object and estimate which you think is heavier. Check if your grown up agrees. You could use two buckets or bags to load your items into to see which has the stronger down pull. Count how many items you have loaded and then say if you think they will be heavier or lighter give an explanation as to why you think one is heavier or lighter than the other. I think it is ...



Choose an item like an apple or a stone. Can you find items which are lighter and heavier? Sort them in to sets. Can you find an item lighter but bigger than your apple or stone?

Remember yesterday when you looked to see what animals visited your garden or the space outside your window? Well today, we are going to help some creatures in our garden feel safe and welcome.

Today, can you make a bug hotel?



1. Can you find an old plant pot out in the garden, or an old mug you no longer use? They make brilliant bug hotels! All you have to do is fill your pot or mug with natural materials. If you don't have a pot or mug, don't worry, simply make a pile of the things outlined in the next step instead.

- 2. Collect leaves, twigs, hollow stems, grass, bits of bark and stuff them inside. These are the perfect materials to help create warm, dry spaces that will attract different creepy crawlies.
- 3. Place pot or mug on its side (so it doesn't fill with rain, obviously the tube option would not be quite as waterproof), leave it in a sheltered corner of the garden and wait for its grateful new residents to move in.
