



- Today can you have a go at putting those tricky words into sentences?


Reminder:

Adults- Below are the tricky words that your child has been taught so far in Reception

- Set 1 was taught first, then set 2 and now we are onto set 3 (set 3 is not in your pencil case yet).
- Please make sure your child is confident with spelling the tricky words (without you having to help them) in set 1 before moving onto set 2 and then you can move onto the set 3 words you will find below.
- Please make sure you focus on the tricky words that your child needs more practise with. With the
 words they need support with, show them the spelling and encourage them to write it. The more
 practise you do, your child will then no longer have to rely on you showing them the spelling, they will
 be able to spell it by themselves from memory ©







Reception Work to support your child at home MATHS

Activity - Hidden Items- subtraction

Place five small items/cubes on to a tray or table.

Ask "how many items there are?"

Encourage your child to use their fingers to represent the amount of item/cubes are in front of them.

Model counting while they represent the amount of items on their fingers.

Ensure they know the correct amount of items hidden under the cloth.

Cover completely the items/cubes with a cloth.

Then as they watch while you take away two items from under the cloth.

Ask your child to show you using their fingers to show many items were under the cloth to start with and how many have been taken away.

How many cubes did we start with?

How many did I take away?

How many items will be under the cloth now?

How did you work it out?

Extension – take ten items place them in a line. Then take it in turns to take 1, 2, or 3 pebbles. The winner is the one who avoids taking the last pebble.
