Below are some examples of how you can support your child at home with their phonics knowledge.

Children learn best with daily practise and by repeating the learning.

Day 3 –Read each sentence below, find the oa and igh sounds in each sentence and write the words with these sounds. How many words did you find? Can you write your own sentences using the same words.

Challenge yourself to think of some different words with these sounds and have a go at writing them or clap them to your grown up.

For example – coat would be three claps for the sounds you say **c** oa **t**

It was a red and blue boat.

You can put the lights on at night.

The toast is hot and yummy.

Dan said get the soap.

My coat is tight.

The road has got lots of traffic.

Do you have a goat in the garden?

Read your reading book or a favourite book from home and write down the tricky words you find


Reception Work to support your child at home MATHS

Day 3-Using your part, part whole again investigate fair and unfair groups of objects.


Working with objects up to ten. Which amount can be halved fairly and which can not. Match the number to the amount before you start.

The difference between fair and unfair sharing can be used to create the idea of half being one of two equal parts.

Find 10 items or make ten small paper balls. Investigate which amount can be halved equally and which can not. Talk about each amount before you start. Identify the number to match the amount. Share the amount into two equal groups. Can the number of objects be share equally and how many is in each equal part?



Can not be halved equally or fairly because there is is 1 left over after sharing.



Unfair because it has not been halved or shared equally.

Can 3 be shared equally into halves? No because it is unfair. It can not be halved equally.


Repeat with different amounts of objects.

 How do you think people could get to Wales from where we live (England)?
